
How the AASA Learning 2025 Western Pennsylvania Alliance — in partnership with Remake Learning — is bringing families, community organizations and innovative school districts together to create a new learning landscape.

When it comes to learning, you could say some kids in Western Pennsylvania have never had it better.

And you'd be right, thanks to a dedicated alliance of 34 local school districts working to explore new, life-changing learning experiences for children. Together, these programs have put a national spotlight on the Pittsburgh region as a model of successful public-private education partnership — one that leans heavily on the collective efforts of educators, parents, neighborhood groups and businesses.




What would it be like to work as a drone pilot? In May of this year, a group of 20 high schoolers in the Pittsburgh region began a training program to do just that.

Fly Like a Girl (FLAG) Drone Academy was created by three educators — Dr. Janeen Peretin, director of communication, innovation and advancement at Baldwin-Whitehall, Emily Sanders, assistant superintendent at Beaver Area and Dr. Kristin Deichler, assistant superintendent at South Fayette — who applied jointly for the Moonshot Grant.

They used that grant funding to purchase professional-grade drones and build a training program that could prepare high school students to take the Federal Aviation Administration's drone pilots exam. Students from Baldwin-Whitehall, Beaver and South Fayette applied to join, as did several students from Ambridge and McKeesport.

Allegheny Valley School District focuses on student wellness for better academic success by introducing social-emotional learning lessons and a wellness center.

Chartiers Valley School District collaborates with Allegheny Health Network for The Chill Project to address stress.

Fox Chapel Area School District emphasizes the importance of technology and emotional well-being in education and applies these concepts to the school culture and student support systems.

Northgate School District partners with Orchard View Stables to integrate horses in addressing student emotional needs.

California Area School District utilizes therapy animals to improve learning culture and student well-being, witnessing positive changes in social and emotional development.

Brownsville Area School District prioritizes learning over traditional metrics, revamping early literacy methods with the science of reading and creating student report cards that reflect student growth.

New Castle Area School District incorporates human-centered design in the curriculum to ensure innovative teaching practices like project-based learning and STEAM in core subject areas.

Purchase Line School District emphasizes project-based learning in alignment with future careers by providing opportunities through students in career pathways.

South Allegheny School District introduces the Modern Teacher program for tailored professional development for its teachers.

School districts like **Butler**, **Clairton City**, **Hampton Township**, and **New Brighton Area** develop their "Portrait of a Graduate" to redefine and enhance educational strategies.

At the same time, **Deer Lakes School District** formulates a "Portrait of a Graduate" as a vision for modern education, with community input at its core.

Seneca Valley School District engages students in extra-curricular activities through the FIRST® LEGO® League robotics clubs across all six of their elementary schools.

Greater Latrobe School District engages students in real-world projects with a student-run business that produces personalized goods.

Baldwin-Whitehall School District launched an Esports program for grades 7-12.

Crawford Central School District aims for more robust two-way communication with parents.

Hollidaysburg Area School District empowers students with more say in their learning, leading to increased engagement from library makerspaces, flipped classrooms, and externships to expanded AP courses.

Career Exploration & Workforce Development

Duquense City School District, Avonworth, Elizabeth Forward, and South Fayette work together to collaborate and offer the World of Work framework for early career exploration.

Cornell School District designs a mandatory career readiness course with local employers and offers pathways in computer science, clean energy, healthcare, public policy, and the trades.

Jefferson-Morgan School District partners with local businesses to connect students to careers through paid internships.

Keystone Oaks School District transforms its tech program with a partnership with Robert Morris University, preparing students for STEM careers.

Learning Environments

Franklin Regional School District is updating instructional spaces to support collaboration and problem-solving with flexible spaces.

Frazier School District integrates "chill corners" and outdoor spaces for improved learning and stress reduction.

Shaler Area School District transitions to a learner-centered environment, partnering with various stakeholders, including teachers, counselors, families, community members, and futurists, to reimagine learning spaces.
