"Learning to Mend: Healing-Informed Responses to School Pushout Among Black Girls"



The Dr. Effie H. Jones Memorial Luncheon provides a space where equity and excellence in schools are both celebrated and discourses. PUSHOUT is the first trade book to tell the stories of Black girls who disproportionately experience school discipline, exposing a world of confined potential and supporting the growing movement to address the policies, practices, and cultural illiteracy that push countless students out of school and into unhealthy, unstable, and often unsafe futures. In this presentation, Dr. Morris will discuss the gender-responsive, healing-centered strategies that interrupt the school-to-confinement pathways experienced by our girls and young women.



Monique W. Morris, Ed.D. is an author and social justice scholar with more than 25 years of professional and volunteer experience in the areas of education, civil rights, juvenile and social justice. Dr. Morris is the author of *Pushout: The Criminalization of Black Girls in Schools* (The New Press, 2016), *Black Stats: African Americans by the Numbers in the Twenty-First Century* (The New Press, 2014), and *Too Beautiful for Words* (MWM Books, 2012).


